Mid Suffolk Magazine

The Autumn edition of the Mid Suffolk Magazine has been issued and should be delivered to every household in the District. If residents don't receive their copy or if they receive more than one, please could they let us know.

Windows in grade II listed buildings

Listed buildings often suffer from poor energy performance due to factors such as poorly fitting windows and single glazing. Mid Suffolk has now introduced a Local Listed Building Consent Order ("LLBCO"), making it possible for certain window improvements to be made in Grade II listed buildings without the need for listed building consent. The improvements which can be made, all subject to certain conditions, are:-

- Installation of secondary glazing without needing consent from the council.
- Where original windows have already been replaced after receiving listed building consent, they can be replaced again.
- In a modern extension to a listed building, windows can be replaced, or have secondary glazing installed if they have previously received listed building consent.

Postal vote registration

Residents who have, in the past, been registered to vote by post should have received a letter from the council advising that the government has changed the system and now registration is only valid for three years. Anyone wishing to continue to vote by post will need to complete a renewal application. If this is not done, their current registration will end on 31st January 2026.

Norwich to Tilbury power lines

The Development Consent Order for the planned development has been accepted and is now with the national Planning Inspectorate. Anyone wishing to make a representation needs to register with the Inspectorate at https://national-infrastructure-consenting.planninginspectorate.gov.uk/projects/EN020027. Registration closes on 27th November 2025.

Locality Awards

The current round of grants, which began in April this year, will close in January. This is different from previous years, when applications have been

able to continue until March. After January, any grant allocation remaining will transfer into the wider Community Development Grant budget. We have so far allocated most of our locality award grant for this year and have about £600 remaining, so if any groups would like to submit an application, do let us know as soon as possible.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

NOVEMBER 2025

Devolution and the new Mayoral Authority for Norfolk and Suffolk At the Council on 2 October, Suffolk County Council voted to give the government their consent to create the Norfolk and Suffolk Combined Authority, which will be led by a mayor for Norfolk and Suffolk. Both Norfolk County Council and Suffolk County Council are involved in creating the new authority, which will have powers for the two counties, including economic development, transport, skills and employment, public safety, housing and strategic planning. The authority will be led by a mayor, with four other members, two appointed by Suffolk County Council and two appointed by Norfolk County Council, and decisions will be made by majority, but the majority must include the vote of the mayor or the deputy mayor if the mayor is not present. The authority can also have associate members (for example, somebody from a local college or university) or a non-constituent member, for example, from a district or borough council. The election of the mayor for Norfolk and Suffolk will be held on Thursday, 7 May 2026. The role of the Police and Crime Commissioner will be undertaken by the mayor after they are elected. Labour, Liberal Democrat and Reform UK candidates will likely be announced in the next few months.

Get Suffolk Working Plan

On 2 October, the Cabinet voted to approve the draft Get Suffolk Working plan, which was prepared by the council's Skills team. This is the local version of the government's Get Britain Working initiative and aims to support people of working age who are not currently working to get into employment and address barriers they may face to employment, for example, poor health, lack of transport, low qualifications and digital exclusion. Once the plan is approved by NHS partners in Suffolk and the Department of Work and Pensions (DWP), a Get Suffolk Working Partnership Board will be created to oversee the work. The plan includes the launch of the Connect to Work programme, which will be funded by up to £9.5m from the DWP over five years. The amount of funding received depends on the level of participation in the scheme. This programme is to provide tailored training, support and job placements and match people with suitable employers based on their preferences, strengths and previous work experience.

Get Britain Working plans will become the responsibility of the mayor of Norfolk and Suffolk, and the mayoral authority, once in place, so Suffolk County Council is working with Norfolk County Council to make sure their plans are aligned. Dental Services in Suffolk

At the Health Scrutiny Committee on 8 October, colleagues from the NHS joined the meeting to update the committee on improving dental services in Suffolk. This is not a council service, and health partners from the two Integrated Care Boards (ICBs) that cover the county (Suffolk and North East Essex; Norfolk and Waveney) ran through their progress to increase access to NHS dentists, increase the number of urgent appointments available and ensure that there are enough dental practices across the county. They are also undertaking outreach work on oral health and preventing issues with children and older adults. Both ICBs are reporting that they have managed to increase the number of adults and children seen by dentists, and they are working on changes to their contracts with dental providers to support a focus on the highest priority patients. People who need a dentist appointment can contact NHS 111 to get one, as well as contact dental practices directly.

Many changes in health service provision are coming soon, including the NHS 10 Year Plan, which was published earlier this year, and, from 1 April 2026, Norfolk and Suffolk will have one ICB. This means that plans for dentistry in the region, like other services, may be subject to review.

Recycling Centres Raise £500,000 for Charity

Re-use shops at Suffolk's recycling centres at Bury St Edmunds and Foxhall have raised over half a million pounds for the local charity, The Benjamin Foundation, which operates the shops and provides families with childcare, mental health, youth and housing support. White goods play a key role, as The Benjamin Foundation repairs broken appliances and sells them on, which not only prolongs the life of the appliance but also helps families access affordable household goods. The shop at Foxhall opened in 2016, and the one in Bury St Edmunds opened in 2020, and they have together repurposed over 4,200 tonnes of waste so far. Suffolk residents do not need to book a slot at the recycling centre to visit or donate to the shops.

Budget Survey

The council has launched its annual budget survey, where it asks Suffolk residents their opinions and priorities for how it should spend money in the 2026-2027 financial year. The consultation tries to provide some context on its financial position, as well as asking for feedback, which

will be included in the budget-setting process. The first look at the new budget will be early January 2026, with councillors voting on the proposed budget in its February full council meeting. Quarterly Review of 2025-26 Revenue Budget and 2025-29 Capital Programme

On 4 November, the Cabinet reviewed the actual income and expenditure against their current budget provision. Based on figures for quarter 2, the council is predicting a revenue budget overspend of £20.398m. It is also predicting that it will underachieve income by £0.436m. This means the predicted total overspend will be £20.834m for 2025-26, which the council plans to cover using funds from its Risk Reserve. This is an increase of £7.5m compared to the predicted overspend at the end of Q1 (£13.3m)

The Dedicated Schools Grant (DSG) overspend is predicted to be £72.9m by the end of the year, with the negative balance on the DSG 'reserve' due to increase by £70.4m to -£168m during 2025-26.

The Capital budget set for 2025-29 was £361.8m but is now likely to be £500.5m, an increase of £138.7m. This includes £100m of unspent budget from the previous year being carried forward, and £38m of subsequent additions to the capital programme. As of Q2, the council is likely to spend £150.8m of its £185.9m capital budget for 2025-26. £4m of this is net scheme underspends, and £39.1m is a net carry forward of budgets into 2025-26.

Reserves are projected to reduce by £39.7m during 2025-26.

Of forecast net interest costs, £4.9m relates to the cost of the additional borrowing required as a result of the DSG deficit.


Projected overspends for the year include £4.545m in Adult Social Care, £10.150m in Children and Young People, and £5.105m in Central Resources and Capital Financing.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

NOVEMBER 2025



This month's meeting opened with 5 members of the public, 6 Parish Councillors and Councillors Pearson, Watson and Welham and a Police Officer from the Neighbourhood Team.

Councillors' Reports: The full reports can be found elsewhere in Telstar. In response to requests for detailed information, SCC Cllr Welham advised that criteria for siting speed indicator devices (SIDs) require the edge of the sign to be offset from the road by 600mm, and there must be an adequate area around the sign for servicing it safely. He also reported that he had requested a bus timetable including all services through Stowupland, but it has not yet been provided. He also suggested that the PC take up the matter of FP19 with the County footpaths officer. He was asked if the scheduled May Council elections would still take place, as certain sections of the press were indicating that they would be postponed again. He advised that, as far as the Council were concerned, they would take place in May 2026, but it is down to the Government who may make changes. It was also questioned about the amount of work that the elected Norfolk and Suffolk Mayor would be expected to take on in addition to the Mayoral duties, as it is expected that they will take over the Police and Crime Commissioners' role within a year and the fire service the following year.

MSDC Cllr Pearson advised that there would be some relaxation in the need for listed building consent with fitting new windows, but it was unclear at present whether double glazing can replace single-glazed windows. It is felt that the mayoral election may be postponed as the Government does not have time to complete the issues required.

Matters of Report: The new SID for Church Road has arrived and is awaiting installation, as is the sign for the Retreat Pond, and smart water kits are being distributed. The handrail on FP32 has been installed. Everything else is ongoing.

Public Forum: A resident advised that the 'Pride in Your Place' grants are open, which could be applied for, for planting the mounds on the Green. He was concerned that the map supplied as part of the SCC footpath cutting was inaccurate, as some of the paths have been tarmacked. Another resident advised that the wildlife board in the Churchyard needs repairing. Another resident had concerns about a drainage point on the footpath behind Sycamore Road, which needed repair, and a pipe was blocked near the Maple Road bridge. A resident reiterated his concern for the speed of vehicles along Saxham Street, as stated in his letter to the PC. This has been brought up with Highways, who have stated that a speed indicator device cannot be safely installed in Saxham Street. The Chairman suggested that if, but maybe the more residents who complain to Highways, this may have some influence.

Police: The Police Officer advised that they had no suspects for the recent break-ins to the sheds on the allotment but will continue to keep an eye on them. There have also been reports of bottles of milk being stolen from doorsteps in the village, and residents are asked to report any suspicious behaviour that they see. He also reported that the Police are currently working with the school on several issues.

Governance: The external audit report has been completed, and the risk assessment has been approved.

Nationally Significant Infrastructure Projects (NSIPs): Councillors noted that consultation on the proposed line for the Norwich to Tilbury grid upgrade has commenced and decided to submit a response to the consultation. The PC will need to register before the end of the month to submit a Parish response. Individual responses can also be made.

Joint Local Plan: Councillors noted the issue of the Call for Sites for 2025 and decided on any comments on the 5-year draft land supply plan. It was felt that no comment was necessary as there is sufficient land supply for the next 5 years.

Telstar Reporting: Councillors noted the resignation of the current Telstar reporter and discussed how best to report meetings in the future. I stated that I have had to resign from reporting Parish Council meetings for Telstar due to personal reasons that have now become unsustainable, but I would like to thank everyone for their support, including the 3 clerks, I started with a Rachel and have finished with a Rachel, and the many chairmen that I have worked with over the last 14-15 years. It was agreed that the PC would advertise for a volunteer in Telstar to get someone in as soon as possible.

Village Hall Occupational Licenses: Councillors approved the licence agreements for both the play park and the storage cupboard. Regular checks are made of the emergency supplies to ensure that they are still in order and in date; however, the Village Hall Trustees require a full inventory of everything in the cupboard. A few bits have changed in the Play Park, and there are some concerns about tree safety. The Village Hall Trustees also require needs a full list of equipment in the park.

Sub-Committee/Working Group Reports:

Biodiversity and Wildlife – Councillors received the minutes from the last biodiversity group meeting and the meeting between the group and the Parish Council. They currently have 3 kilos of grass seed supplied by MSDC, and it was agreed that this would be planted first, and then that would indicate how much more needs to be purchased. It was agreed to plant wild flowers on the corners of the mounds, and they will then be strimmed annually, and to explore the costs. The no-mow May will be looked at again before 2027 when the current mowing contract is up for renewal.

It was agreed to instigate more advertising options to encourage more volunteers to assist with biodiversity. Some dead trees on The Green need to be cut down, and it is proposed to use the logs to make bug hotels. There are a lot of flints on parts of The Green which are to be collected and used when the village sign is moved.

Finance and Policy – Cllrs were asked to note receipts and payments for the month and the VAT return, and to receive financial reports on bank reconciliation, budget to actual and reserves.

Footpaths – Councillors noted the updated cutting schedule from SCC, but this needs to be reviewed as some of them no longer have grassed surfaces. Some of them have not been cut for 2 years and may not be usable.

Planning – 2 planning applications have been received this month, one for the erection of driveway gates at Columbyne Hall, which was supported, and the erection of a single-storey extension to a workshop at Stowupland Hall, but due to the positioning, it was agreed to object.

MSDC granted permission and listed building consent to Elm House and granted permission for tree work to be carried out in Saxham Street.

Play Park – MSDC will be carrying out the annual inspection of the playpark in January 2026, and the council will need to discuss any actions arising from this. It was decided to wait until the report comes back to see if the same matters come up again, and to decide in 6 months whether to continue with the management of the Play Park as funds are becoming much tighter, or to pass the responsibility back to the Village Hall Trustees next year.

Councillors' Reports: Cllr Easter reported that the Chestnut Close road sign is lying on the floor. He would like to have a meeting about the village plan.

Cllr Voden met with the new Emergency Planning Officer, who feels that Stowupland is well ahead with its emergency plan. In the case of an emergency, the Sports and Social Club can be used alongside the main village hall. The fridge magnets, which were handed out several years ago, are still current. There is information on the website about 'grab bags' that you would take with you in the case of an emergency. He represented the PC at the recent induction of the new Haughley vicar, which went well. Cllr Voden also attended the Stowmarket Mayor's Civic Reception at the Regal, which gave a good platform for networking. The Young SODS were the recipients of the mayor's award. There is a finger post missing on FP3. He reminded everyone of the Remembrance Service at 10 am on Sunday, and he thanked those who arranged for a new wreath.

Clerk's Report: The Clerk reported that a meeting had been held with residents regarding the drainage works at Footpath 32 and that everything would be done in accordance with the plans.

Other queries relating to footpaths have been forwarded to the footpath officer. The hedge cutting at the school is progressing. A tidy up at the cemetery took place on 27th September, and matters have been discussed with Landex regarding the access and ditch. Smart water kits are being issued to allotment holders whose sheds were broken into, and the annual rental bills have been issued to the allotment holders. Earl Stonham has some vacant allotments available. Bollard damage has been repaired free of charge by Jarvis and Sons, for which the PC are very grateful, and there have been offers of grass cutting. MSDC are clarifying ownership of certain areas within the village to establish maintenance responsibilities. The vacancy on the PC can be co-opted as no call for an election.

Correspondence: There were further updates amongst the correspondence this month relating to the Norwich to Tilbury pylons and also the proposed changes to Local Government. One resident thanked the PC for their report of a dangerous pothole in Columbyne Close, which has now been repaired, and one from a resident commenting on the overgrown hedge alongside the footpath on Bloor Homes land, for which their management team are responsible. Another resident reported the missing road sign in Saxham Street, and there was further correspondence about the need for a speed indicator device in Saxham Street. Briefing notes from both SALC and MSDC and also grant information from MSDC. Citizen Advice sent a breakdown of the work that they have been undertaking and requesting a donation. There was also information on neighbourhood planning companies that are assisting adjoining parishes.

The meeting was closed to the public at 8.57 pm.

To all of you who have read my many Parish Council reports that I have written for Telstar over the years, I would like to say thank you and farewell. Sandy Smith

COUNTRYSIDE RAMBLER

The goldfinches are enjoying the seeds in the feeders; about eight to a dozen appear daily just after first light. I believe they come off the roost and visit the feeders for a quick breakfast, then disappear into the countryside where there are still plenty of wild seeds available and, with the mild weather through October, they are not unduly hungry as yet. I have also had greenfinches and the odd chaffinch; the latter normally keeps under the feeders to quickly feed on the fallen seeds the goldfinches dislodge. I have noticed that two separate cock pheasants will arrive early and pick up any fallen seeds. One has a white ring around its neck, and the other, I believe, is called an old English pheasant, as it has no white feathery collar. The red kite population has really increased in numbers as I spot them locally every day, along with buzzards, kestrels and a lone sparrow hawk, which flies past my feeders every morning, hoping to prey upon an unsuspecting finch. So far, I haven't seen any evidence of a successful kill, but he certainly puts panic into the local bird population when he arrives.

I hope you have enjoyed searching the woodland for fungi; a few are still present and probably will be until the first frosts. Don't forget to look on the trunks of trees for bracket fungi, such as beef steak and hoof varieties. Mixed woodland can be very productive with oak, silver birch and beech being the best to search under, also check out any fallen rotten trees and old stumps.



By now, most of our hibernating mammals and reptiles are snuggly hidden and out of harm's way. Although the weather was exceptionally mild through October, it can change overnight with biting winds and frosts, and November can be the month this happens. So far, we have been lucky with the airstream being southerly, but behold, when it becomes northerly. I don't want to be gloomy, but please be prepared, as winter can come at astonishing speed and unexpectedly.

At this time of year, I normally observe a small flock of meadow pipits on the grassy scrubland in front of our property. I suspect these birds are passing through, as they only stay for a day or two; even then, they are a joy to see locally. Whilst in north Norfolk recently, I spotted a large flock of fieldfare. I presume they had only just flown in from

Scandinavia, as they were very hungry and feasted on the hawthorn berries with gusto. Some of them appeared slightly drabber. I suspect they were first winter birds.

This is the best mast year I have witnessed with the bushes and trees laden with fruit, berries and nuts. I recently walked through woodland with the dominant species being oak, and, what a delight, squirrels gathering nuts and scampering away to hide them, the jays flying in all directions with bulging crops and one in their beak for good measure. Wood pigeons actually gorge themselves with this substantial offering and can often have eight or more stuffed in their crop. It must take a considerable time to digest these hard seeds; perhaps that is why pigeons sit about a lot and look distinctly grumpy.

We have a footpath in front of our property and many local people and dog walkers stroll past every morning at varying times. This can be a good indication of the temperature outside, due to the attire they are wearing; the time of shorts and tee shirts is long gone and now fleeces and coats are normally the fashion; woolly hats and gloves are the next accessory I suppose, with the inevitable wellies as footwear. On that note, I will stop writing, but before that, may I wish you all a very joyous festive season and a happy 2026.



RAMBLINGS FROM THE POTTING SHED

Tulips are a go go! Yes, finally, we can start popping the last of the Spring bulbs in. I have been put off by so many different sources telling me it's too early, but I think it's now or never! At the time of writing, the weather is still very mild, but I suspect cold snaps are on their way. I did read an article by a climate scientist stating that in 20 years' time in December, Australia would be in winter and we would be in Summer as the jet streams continue to change with global warming, a slightly frightening thought. As the nights draw in, it's also time to sit down with some of those gardening books you never get round to looking at. As well as, of course, popping the titles you'd like on the Christmas list! I have my eye on Pollyanna Wilkinson's new book, How to Design a Garden. A respected but down to earth author who makes everything look achievable!

Garden chores this month are as follows:

- Rotate houseplants. Move them away from cold draughts and radiators.
 Grouping them together to increase humidity is also a good idea. Reduce watering and don't feed foliage plants until spring.
- Still indoors, check hyacinths, especially if you are forcing them for Christmas flowering. Move to a cool, bright room once growth is about 5 cm tall.
- For plants such as teasels and echinaceas, allow the seed heads to remain to provide food for the birds and shelter for insects.
- Greenhouse cleaning time, especially while the weather is so warm. Scrub inside and out and have the bubble wrap ready to protect sheltering plants.
- If you have piled up your leaves in the compost heap or a shady corner, very gently, give those leaves one more turn before leaving to rot down. Be careful in case early hibernators have decided to make your heap their home.
- Plant bare-root fruit trees. Ensure the roots are soaked in a bucket of water for 30 minutes before planting. Plant in a large hole, stake and mulch.
- My pet peeve: cover brassicas to protect from pigeons! We have a lot in Stowupland, and I lost all my kale last year.

Many will already be aware, this year is a 'mast' year. Trees bearing nuts and fruit are in overdrive, producing excessive crops. This is to ensure survival and germination. The Woodland Trust explains that this abundance also causes a boom in populations of small mammals like mice...probably not what those of us with gardens facing fields want to hear. This phenomenon only happens every 5 to 10 years and has a major evolutionary advantage for trees like oaks and horse chestnuts, as more saplings will root into the ground. The tree's growth will be slightly stunted in a mast year, as the energy required to produce all those nuts and seeds takes away from the growth spurt. Thank you for another year of supporting this column, and thank you to all those villagers who stop and chat on my village walks, in the butchers' or whilst I am tending the Meadow. It's always lovely to hear your gardening conundrums. Have a safe and fulfilling Christmas and New Year, and Happy Gardening!

With it coming up to Christmas, I want to do more shopping online, but there's been things in the news about delivery problems. I'm worried about not receiving things on time or packages being lost. What should I do if my parcel goes missing?



When you're online shopping, it's not always clear who to contact if things go wrong.

As a customer, your contract is with the seller that you bought the item from. It's the seller's responsibility to make sure the item is delivered to you. They should chase the courier to find out what happened to your order if there's a problem.

If your parcel hasn't arrived:

- Check the delivery address you gave the seller, to make sure it's correct.
- Then contact the seller and ask where your order is.
- If the seller claims they've delivered it or doesn't know where it is, you can ask for a redelivery. You might be able to get a refund in some circumstances where the delivery time was essential, and you let the seller know ahead of time.

Under the Consumer Rights Act 2015, you can ask the seller to deliver the item to you again if the item wasn't delivered either by an agreed date, or within a reasonable time - usually within 30 days. If the new delivery fails to come within a reasonable time, you can ask the seller for a refund.

Another problem people face is when parcels get left in different places, for example, outside or with a neighbour.

If your item was delivered by Royal Mail:

- And they left your package with a neighbour or in a certain place because you
 told them to, it's not the seller or Royal Mail's responsibility if it gets lost.
- If they leave it somewhere you hadn't instructed, it's the seller's responsibility if it gets lost. You should contact the seller to ask for a redelivery or a refund.

If the item was delivered by a courier:

 Check your terms and conditions or account details - they might include other places for delivery, like your porch or a neighbour's house. If you agreed to them, it's not the seller's or courier's responsibility if your order has gone missing. However, if you did not agree to this, then it's the seller's responsibility if your order goes missing.

If you ordered something from a private seller or you're still having trouble after trying the tips above, you can find out more via the Citizens Advice website at https://www.citizensadvice.org.uk/consumer/.

Wildflower Meadow and Retreat Pond

We planted a few more patches of yellow rattle and wildflower seeds, and a patch of cowslips in October. We will be providing an information board to help people identify flora and fauna throughout the year.

The Retreat Pond has been dug out to remove silt, and we have started to trim around the edges of the pond and tidy up the area at the back of the pond.

We plan to have work parties on the second Friday of every month; the next will be on 12 December, meeting at the pond.

The remainder will be tackled in spring 2026.





STOWUPLAND LOCAL HISTORY GROUP

LOCAL HISTORY GROUP

Hopefully you are reading this in time to join us on Wednesday, 3rd December, when our guest speaker Kathleen Hallaway will help us "Explore Tudor Cooking"

in "Mistress Kathleen's Kitchen". This will be our last meeting in the Village Hall. From February 2026, we have a new home at the URC Hall, so let's make it a good one.

If you are unable to join us, then Happy Yule Tide Greetings from SLHG.

Don't forget we don't meet in January, so our next session is on Wednesday, February 4th, 2026, when we welcome Gerry Barnes to learn about The Orchards of Eastern England and their importance to the rural economy and biodiversity. This will be our first meeting in our new venue at the URC Hall.

Looking back to October, we welcomed Dr Mike Walker, who shared his research into "The 1173 Siege of Haughley Castle and the subsequent Battle at Fornham."

Neil had conjured up a treat with this talk from Mike Walker. Thanks to all who turned out for this one on a fairly cold evening. For those of you reading this, you may wonder what bearing this had on Stowupland. Well, quite a bit; as if things had gone differently, the history of the UK as we now know it may well have looked a great deal different from what we have today.

Background: A revolt began in April 1173, largely due to King Henry II of England's efforts to find lands for his younger son, Prince John. John's three brothers objected to their father's efforts in this area and fled to the court of King Louis V11 of France, where they all decided to raise troops for a rebellion. This action resulted in an invasion of Normandy, and the King of Scotland was persuaded to invade England.

These invasions failed, and negotiations also did not end well. As Henry II was holding discussions with Louis at a summit to bring peace, the Earl of Leicester, who was at the meeting did not agree with the proposals for peace terms. It is said that he drew his sword on Henry II, which was unheard of in those days. As you can imagine, the meeting broke up fairly quickly with no agreement on peace terms.

Unbeknown to the King, the Earl of Leicester had a fleet waiting with troops embarked and several Flemish mercenaries, which was ready to go, and they landed at Walton in Suffolk in late September 1173 (Not Waltonon-the-Naze but Suffolk's Walton, which is now under the sea.) Things did not start well, as this was not received well by the local population, and the Flemish troops were not well received in the area at all.

Leicester decided to try and join with several known rebels. One was Hugh Bigod, the Earl of Norfolk, at his castle at Framlingham. This alliance resulted in inconclusive fighting in the area. After this, the Earl of Leicester decided to return to his base but was prevented by Royalist forces under the command of Richard de Lucy, whom Henry II had placed in charge of the defence of the realm while he was away in France. While Leicester was trying to move his forces back to his base, the Royalist forces had attacked his castle and prevented the rebels from reaching the safety of their base.

Battle Plans and Tactics: Leicester had about 3000 troops on the date 17th October 1173. With no base, the army was roaming the country, looking for provisions and a base. They were being challenged by the Royalist forces under the command of Richard de Lucy. He was supported by 300 mounted knights, who were all loyal to the Crown. The knights were well-proven in recent combat; in support was the Earl of Norfolk's son with his own supporters. Leicester, for some reason, decided to split his forces as they were looking for fresh water supplies. The Royalists caught up with the rebel forces as they were fording the River Lark, near the present villages of Fornham St Genevieve, Fornham All Saints and Fornham St Martin, which is about 4 miles from Bury St Edmunds.

Leicester's cavalry was defeated, and many were captured by the Royalist knights. Most of his ground troops were driven into the nearby swamps, where they were also attacked by the local population, who had not taken kindly to their presence in the area. Leicester and the remaining troops retreated to Fornham All Saints church, where they were all captured at about 6 o'clock that evening.

Leicester remained in captivity until his release in January 1177, by which time the King had returned and some of his estate was returned to him, this granted by King Henry II.

Mike also touched on his research into the Cult of St. Edmunds, which was fascinating.

I asked Mike at our Q&A & session what would have happened if this had resulted in a rebel victory. Apparently, this may have meant that the rebels could have got stronger and threatened London or gone north and persuaded the King of Scotland to join them. If this had happened, it would have presented Henry II with big problems, but as it did not, then we shall never know. Sandra thanked Mike for his talk, which was excellent. He has more facts and figures than I can include; he also has a well-illustrated book on the subject. Thanks to Liz and Annie for the welcome refreshment.

FROM OUR ARCHIVES

We have written before about the history of Myrtle Cottages. In researching stories for our Stowupland Stories 3 about Crime & Punishment, I found out that Francis Webb, who lived there in the mid-19th century, had several brushes with the law. No doubt if Francis's crimes had been committed a decade or two earlier, he would have been sentenced to transportation, as we know that, in the early 1840s, 15-year-old Walter Tricker had been sentenced to 14 years' transportation. His crime had been stealing 5 tame rabbits.

To return to 25-year-old Francis Webb. In December 1864, the local paper carried a report entitled 'A Clever Capture.' This read like an episode of a modern-day police drama about how Francis and his accomplice, Spencer Ford, aka Mushy, were tracked down. Local police knew that two young strangers had arrived at Green Hills in Soham at the beginning of December, but although 'the habits of the men attracted the attention of the police, they could not get a sight of them for some time without exciting suspicion, they therefore patiently awaited a proper opportunity to introduce themselves a la mode to the newcomers.' Then one Sunday, when the officers were 'settled down to the scent,' Inspector Yardley, accompanied by constables Flanders, Barker and Clarke, politely knocked at the cottage door requesting admission, but, receiving no answer, repeated the request in an 'unmistakable manner'. The inmates replied, "They were not at home to company at so late an hour."

'However, the gentlemen in blue were so intent upon a closer acquaintance that after a few minutes parley, crash went the door and two of the blue coats presented themselves, at the same moment the back window was smashed out from the inside' but there stood a policeman ready to 'receive the would-be boulter'.

'Both men were secured, and a search of the house found 7 turkeys, 16 fowls, a large tame rabbit, all recently killed, and a quantity of feathers and bones. The report concluded that it was suspected that the men had been sending the poultry to dealers in Leadenhall Market, in London.

Francis pleaded not guilty but was convicted and sentenced to 7 years penal servitude, whilst Mushy, who had pleaded guilty, was sentenced to 9 months hard labour.


