PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

MARCH 2019

The meeting opened with 4 members of the public and 5 Parish Councillors present.



Council Report:

The Suffolk CC Councillor was not present at the meeting and did not submit a report. The District Councillor's report can be found elsewhere in Telstar.

Matters of Report:

No response has been received from SCC Cllr Green in respect of the drainage investigation along Thorney Green Road. The mobile Post Office van will be at the Village Hall starting on Wednesday 20th March from 2-4pm and each following Wednesday. No further updates on the fencing at the basketball court in the Play Park, or the trimming of the Steeple View hedges, although the High School have been reminded and the meeting with MSDC regarding Thradestone Meadow still has to be arranged. An inspection has been carried out of the tree root on the footpath along the B1115 and necessary repairs will be undertaken. The new bench has been installed on the half a mow. The drains along A1120 will be inspected as part of the maintenance schedule. SCC are monitoring the defect at the junction of Hornbeam and Maple Roads and will repair if the situation deteriorates. Work on the bus shelters has been completed. A meeting has been held between the Parish Council and Stowupland Falcons about a 5 a side pitch on The Green and it was agreed that this should be opposite the butchers and any matches to be held on Sundays should be finished by 12.30pm. Invitations have been sent to allotment holders regarding a meeting to be held on 20th March. Work required on the cemetery building has been scheduled for April and work on the headstones has been completed. Registration of cemetery land still has to be done and a letter has been sent to the PCC regarding registering the church land. The contact address for The Green has been changed to the present Parish Clerk's address. Following a meeting between two Councillors, the Clerk and the Rights of Way Officer a schedule of works was agreed for footpaths 62 and 39. The grass contractor will cut the ditch along Columbyne Close once the weather permits.

Public Forum:

A resident felt that Bloor Homes need to take more responsibility for the amount of rubbish that is allowed to blow off their site and pollute the surrounding footpaths and village area. They have done some clearing but the situation is to be monitored. Also, there are serious concerns about the safety of the pedestrian exit from the Bloor site onto Gipping Road where there is little visibility and where an incident occurred recently when a dog walker stepped out into the path of a car which was luckily travelling slowly enough to stop even though legally, they could have been doing 60mph. Another resident reported some low branches on trees in the cemetery. These particular trees are scheduled to be trimmed shortly. A third resident voiced concerns about the ruts left by a vehicle on The Green but it is not known which vehicle caused the damage. He also reported that some parents are driving their cars over The Green outside Kelvedon House. His final concern was being unable to contact anyone at Stowmarket Police Station but was advised that by ringing 101 he could be put through to the SNT. Another resident reported that the bridge over the ditch near The Retreat needs to be re-wired with wire netting.

Safer Route to School:

The comments by the SCC Cabinet Member who objects to a bridleway through the school premises as part of the safer route to school were discussed, including the proposal that this route should stay as a footpath/cycle track and not a footpath. The Clerk and Cllr Welham will attend a meeting at Endeavour House on 21st March along with the school when this will be discussed further.

Suffolk's Most Active Village Award:

There has been no response to the article in last month's Telstar so it was agreed that Cllr Voden should make direct contact with the various active clubs operating in the village to gain their opinions and bring back this information to a later Parish Council meeting

Sub-Committee Reports:

Community Events – Various sums of money were agreed to be spent to facilitate the forthcoming barn dance, provision of entertainment for the lighting of the beacon on 21st June, the summer teas for both Jubilee Court and Steeple View. It was also agreed that Cllr Murton should undertake some research into whether older residents of the village who live alone would like to have a get together similar to those provided at the sheltered accommodation.

Environment – It was agreed to accept the quote for the provision of 3 new oak village notice boards and for a structural engineer's report to form a basis for a quote to repair the footbridge by the junior school. It was also agreed that the ruts in The Green near Waterworks Cottage should be filled with topsoil and re seeded and that the 2 existing notices at the Hunters Moon track should be re-mounted with new surrounds and re installed to match those at Grays Close.

Footpaths – Next meeting will be held at the beginning of April.

Planning – It was agreed to object to one planning application and to make certain comments on another application.

Transport, Travel and Safety – Once again comments made by the SCC Cabinet Member will be discussed further at the meeting at Endeavour House. However, it was felt that there is too much thought put into what is required for school children and not enough for what is required by residents of the village and that this needs to be borne in mind at this meeting. The next traffic survey will take place at the end of April and the speed watch will re-commence once the weather improves.

Councillors' Reports:

Cllr Murton was advised that the school have issued 6 parking permits to students but this does not help with the student parking along Thorney Green which has caused real problems to residents who were unable to receive oil supplies because the lorry was unable to access their driveways. A suggestion was made that yellow lines are required in order to facilitate access to residents' properties. There is also a problem with dog mess along the track behind Trinity Walk and with the amount of litter blowing off the Bloor site.

Correspondence:

Amongst the correspondence received was a request from St John Ambulance to put signs on The Green to advertise their open gardens event and a request the for Stowmarket Mayor and her consort to wear their chains of office when opening the Nutshell Café on March 29th. The request from the Mayor is to be declined on the grounds that this is not within her area of jurisdiction and felt that her office should have referred the café owner to the Parish Council when they were first approached.

The meeting closed to the public at 9.02pm.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Budget Proposals and Council Tax for 2019/20

The final budget proposals for the next financial year have been agreed with an increase in Council Tax of 2%. The Council also agreed further borrowing of around £25 million to invest in commercial properties; this is in addition to £25 million borrowed and invested in commercial properties such as a car showroom, industrial units, a coffee shop, a restaurant and a M&S store in places like Harlow, Milton Keynes, Peterborough and Brentwood. The total is now £100 million shared equally between Babergh and Mid Suffolk.

Neighbourhood Plan

I'm sure that residents appreciate the work of Jackie Ward and her working group for completing the Neighbourhood Plan ready for a local referendum. MSDC Cabinet agreed on 4 March that the Plan can proceed to the referendum stage. This is the time for residents to vote for the Plan to become a formal planning document. This is a critical step and it is very important that every resident looks at the Plan and, if supportive of the Policies set out in the Plan, votes in favour of the Plan so that there is a defence against predatory developers wishing to turn more of the village into mass housing. Look out for details of the Plan and how to vote; it had been hoped that the referendum could take place on 4 May to coincide with the District Council Elections, but this now seems unlikely.

Planning Applications

The application to build 4 dwellings on land off Gipping Road, adjacent to the private road to Columbine Hall has been withdrawn.

An application has been submitted for a new dwelling on land adjacent to the former Land Army hostel on a site that forms part of the land attached to 2 Columbyne Hall Cottages.

An application has also been submitted for change of use of the 'Atcost' barn at Pooles Farm to a dwelling.

MSDC Funded PCSOs

Funding for two PCSO posts has been agreed and the first has been appointed and is operating around Mid Suffolk. District Councillors

can make referrals to MSDC to request a PCSO visits a particular area within their ward. There will not be an immediate response, and each visit may be for a short length of time. However, a visit to view an area of concern will help to raise an issue, especially where this may have been ongoing. If you have a particular area of concern, please let me know and I will see if I can "refer" it. A second PCSO is being allocated from April.

Development of Facilities at Needham Lake

MSDC have approved funding of £600,000 for a new Visitor Centre development at Needham Lake. It would provide enhanced catering facilities, an information centre and public conveniences and is planned to be open by Summer 2020.

District Council Elections

This is a very short factual report and my last before the District Council elections in May. We are entering a period of 'purdah' during which written expressions of Councillors' views may be printed in election literature but not in general reports. Due to the Council Ward Boundary changes, Stowupland will become part of an enlarged ward with Haughley, Wetherden and Old Newton. The ward will elect two Councillors. My colleague, Rachel Eburne, who currently represents Haughley and Wetherden, and I will be candidates for the new ward. Elections will take place on Thursday 2 May.

COUNTRYSIDE RAMBLER

True spring is here with its flowers, catkins, blossom and some garden birds breaking into song. February was an astonishing month weather wise. I was even rambling in a tee shirt and was still quite hot some days. It may be only me but the crocus and snowdrops seemed to flower for longer this spring; did you think so? I had a pleasant surprise at the end of February; one evening a hedgehog came trundling into the garden. I was sure it was the one I rescued in November 2017, but it may be wishful thinking on my behalf.

I have two hedgehog houses in the garden so it may take up residence and stay; it will be most welcome as it devours garden pests. Also on our garden pond a pair of ducks have started to arrive on a daily basis; they normally nest somewhere in the garden. After hatching they stay a few days, and then wander off to the larger local ponds.

What to look out for in the coming weeks: Frog and Toad spawn may appear in your garden pond. Go out on a mild evening and listen; if you have good hearing, the low croak of a Frog may be heard. The early Butterflies will soon appear: Brimstone, Holly Blue and Peacocks may be on the wing if the weather stays fine. I have noticed a lot of winter Moths at night when I drive home; these hardy Moths are quite abundant on still mild nights and ideal prey for little Owls. We have several pairs of Owls locally.

One of the main things I look out for is the arrival of our feathered friends that

overwintered on a warmer continent. The first may be a Chiffchaff or even a Wheatear, followed by a Sand Martin or Swallow. It really makes my day when I spot the first arrival. If only they could speak and tell us of the adventures they have had over the last few months. We must not forget the winter migrants that stayed with us, the Thrushes, Ducks and Geese. They seem to melt away to their respective breeding grounds quietly and probably overnight.

Make sure your bird boxes are cleaned out for the coming season as birds will often roost in them before breeding.

March Meeting

Geoffrey Kay began his excellent talk by telling us that Gypsy people originated in Kashmir and, perhaps travelling via Egypt, started to arrive in England in medieval times. The word 'Gypsy' is derived from 'Egypt'. The Green Man motif, used on their caravans, came from India. Geoffrey described the four different styles of caravan, which were often wonderfully decorated, and how he built a Reading caravan, as a project. Gypsies have a great affinity with horses and he told us about the Appleby Horse Fair, where deals would be struck for the favoured 'coloured cob' horses. After money had been handed over, a little 'luck money', would be returned to the buyer to serve as compensation if the horse was not as good as expected! Geoffrey's wife's enthusiasm for horses ensured that there was one to pull his finished caravan a short distance, to complete the picture.

Columbine Hall

Last September we greatly enjoyed a visit to Columbine Hall. Dating from 1390 and surrounded by a defensive moat, this was an important manorial hall of the area. It is now filled with fascinating objects and pictures and has gardens designed in the C17 manner. A tour takes two hours and costs £18, including tea and home-made cakes. The Building of the Village Hall: Stowupland Leads the Way - Part 2

In March 1954 it was reported that a start had been made using 'special Aircrete, bricks' and that a man from the ministry had inspected the work that had been done and stated it would be 'a first class village hall'. The meeting was also told that 'our hall has been carefully watched as it was looked upon as an experiment and if it was a success 16 other villages in Suffolk would follow our example'. Progress was very slow and at the parish AGM in 1955 the Chairman reporting on the years progress stated there had been many 'snags and difficulties' but that in another 6 months the hall may be ready.

During the war Parish Council meetings had been held at Green Farm and before that at the school so the AGM in 1956 was the first held at the now completed hall. Mr. A. G. Addison was in the chair. He said that 'The hall was there for everyone to see' and hoped it would be fully used as that was the way to repay the loan of £700 which still remained.

The following year those at the AGM were told the village hall had had a successful year and £400 of the loan had been paid off.

In September 1957 BBC radio recorded a programme at Stowupland about the Village Hall project. Mr. B. Reid, Secretary of Suffolk Rural Community Council; Jack Carter, vice chairman of the Village Hall Committee, and Mr. Fred Longlands of Barrow, where a similar scheme had been completed, took part in the discussion, as did District Nurse Minns. Reviewing the scheme, it seems there had been an initial good turnout of volunteers but as the intricacies of the work grew the work mainly fell to three people, 2 factory workers and a farmer, none who had building experience.

By that time there were 21 such schemes in Suffolk, of which 11 had been completed, more than any other county.

The Hall has served us well now for 63 years and continues to be a hub of village life thanks to the foresight of the Parish Council, the hard work of the volunteers all those years ago and the continuing efforts of the Village Hall Management Committee.

Membership Our membership year begins in April. We hope that present members will re-join and look forward to welcoming new members. The fee for the full year is £12. Members attend meetings for only £1, are able to use our archives and attend members-only visits and Suffolk Local History Council events. Jesus read from the scriptures..... "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour." (Isaiah 61:1 Luke 4:18)

My music knowledge is very limited. I don't listen to much modern music, even worse, I'm ashamed to admit, that I don't listen to much music at all, but there are some song lyrics that stick in your mind. One from my past is, "It's Good News week" by Hedgehoppers Anonymous, and the first verse goes, "It's good news week, someone's dropped a bomb somewhere contaminating atmosphere and blackening the sky." Words from the 1960's but we can wonder how much has changed. This year we have become more aware of the increasing hostility between India and Pakistan. Wars continue and today there are twenty-eight countries either involved in war or who are experiencing armed conflicts within their borders. In 2019 it is estimated that one country is dropping an explosive with a strength you can hardly comprehend once every 12 minutes.

If I turn on the news, or read the paper, there is usually bad news facing me. From persecution to fleeing refugees, from knife crime

to people suffering with cancer, and of course we can't forget Brexit (writing this before March 29th I wonder what will happen). So much bad news. Little good news, but then we often appear to be happier to hear bad news than good. One commercial newspaper that started out to give us good news was scrapped because there was no demand for it!

However, despite what we may think, there is good news out there. We can be thankful to our local free magazines such as 'In Touch' as they carry us good news about our community and its people. We can rejoice at the work Michelle does with our own Monday Community Brew with more and more people coming to share in a time together. We can hear good news from Tools with a Mission where they are enabling people to earn a living and support themselves and their families. We can hear good news from Christian Aid which works with local partners and communities to fight injustice, respond to humanitarian emergencies, campaign for change, and help people claim the services and rights they are entitled to. We can look close at home and all around the world and there is good work going on to ensure good news does exist.

At Stowmarket we have been following a Lent Course entitled "Daring to see God now" and the first session was "The Good News of God." Jesus grew up in a land occupied by the brutal soldiers of the Roman Imperial Army. He had no illusions about what the world was like, he lived in the real world and experienced life as a real person. But he had a message of good news, a message that was taken around the world. He didn't ignore the bad news around him but worked to change things and offered a better way of life for all.

This Easter we remember how Jesus died for us and rose again for us. He brought good news to the world and those who hear his news and act on it have their lives changed forever.

May you all receive and share with others the good news of our Lord and Saviour this Easter time.
