Local government reorganisation



COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

OCTOBER 2025

Guidance and information on 20mph speed limits - My group tabled a motion at July's council meeting to make it easier for communities to obtain a 20mph limit where there is clear local support for it. We argued that the current process with SCC Highways is lengthy and unnecessarily complex at a time when 20mph limits have increasing public support. This motion was rejected by the Conservative administration on the grounds that they were already planning a review of this process. 20's Plenty, a UK organisation that promotes lower speed limits, has some helpful guidance and a draft motion for parish and town councils who are considering a 20mph speed limit, with lots of supporting information including data from the 20mph trial in Wales which showed that lower speed limits significantly reduced accidents, deaths and serious injuries with no impact on journey times. Review of Suffolk Transport Infrastructure - Following the passing of a motion at July's council meeting which acknowledged that intervention was necessary to reduce the reliance on the Orwell Bridge, the council's administration have announced a review of transport infrastructure for Suffolk and requested funding from the government to make improvements. The review will examine what is needed and where, examining areas such as the Orwell Bridge and the A14 corridor, Port of Felixstowe, the Sizewell power stations, and the need to upgrade the Ely and Haughley rail junctions, which the government recently announced there would be no money for. The review will also take into account housing needs and the role of the future Mayor for Norfolk and Suffolk, who will have responsibility for strategic transport. The council has sent an open letter to the Transport Secretary, Heidi Alexander MP, calling for talks about the need for strategic investment in Suffolk's transport infrastructure, which you can read here: https://www.suffolk.gov.uk/asset-library/SCC-response-to-Heidi-Alexander-MP-1.pdf

New Environmental Charity for Suffolk - A new environmental charity jointly established by Sizewell C, East Suffolk Council and Suffolk County Council has pledged to spend at least £78m on boosting biodiversity in Suffolk. The charity, named East Suffolk Trust (EaST), will distribute funds to local organizations through a grants scheme to improve biodiversity and protect natural landscapes. Governed by a Board of independent Trustees, the new charity could help to set out how future major infrastructure projects can help deliver local nature recovery across the country. Sizewell C has pledged at least £78m over the next 70 years and, in addition, the charity will seek funding from other local businesses and organisations to invest in nature. Trustees of the charity include Julian Roughton, former CEO of Suffolk Wildlife Trust, Heather Broughton MBE, former trustee of the National

Lottery Heritage Fund and James Alexander MBE, former trustee of RSPB and former Chair of trustees at Suffolk Wildlife Trust.

All Suffolk Food Waste to be Processed in the County - As part of the new 'Simpler Recycling' laws brought in by the previous Conservative government, councils will have to collect and deal with food waste from all Suffolk households from 2026. The council has set up a four-year contract with Bio Capital to process this food waste locally at a recently approved anaerobic digestion plant at the Adnams Distribution Centre in Reydon near Southwold. Around 31,000 tonnes of household food waste could be sent to the new facility each year, which will be processed to generate green fuel (biomethane), and turned into soil fertiliser, which means Suffolk's food waste will be put to good use.

Awards for Suffolk's Junior Road Safety Officers - The council recently played host to pupils and school staff at the first in-person Junior Road Safety Officer (JRSO) Awards event since before the COVID-19 pandemic. The awards ceremony recognised the dedication and creativity shown by schools and pupils in promoting road safety and encouraging active travel within their communities. The Junior Road Safey Officer (JRSO) scheme has been running for more than 20 years and gives pupils in Years 4 to 6 (ages 9–11) the opportunity to get involved in road safety work at their schools, delivering sessions to peers and taking on initiatives in their wider communities. The scheme is an excellent way to engage with children, parents and carers and expand the reach of the council's road safety education team, with 61 participating schools over the last 12 months.

I have worked with JRSOs at Freeman Primary School; they are very active in the school and report their activity in Telstar.

Update on Homes for Ukraine Scheme - As of 31 March 2025, Suffolk has welcomed 1,747 Ukrainian refugees under the government's Homes for Ukraine scheme, supported by a special team in the Public Health & Communities directorate. The government has introduced the Ukraine Permission Extension Scheme (UPES), which allows people currently living in the UK under an existing Ukraine Visa scheme to apply to extend their stay in the UK for a further 18 months when their valid Ukrainian visa expires. Here is some guidance below for hosts and quests:

- It is important that guests actively apply to extend their visas the visas will NOT be extended automatically
- Guests should submit an application when they have 28 days or less left on their current permission. If they apply too early, their application may be rejected, and they would then need to re-apply later

- If the guest doesn't know the date when their current leave to remain ends, they can sign into their UKVI account (www.gov.uk/evisa/update-ukviaccount) to find out, or they can refer to their permission letter which will detail their visa expiry date
- Applications can only be submitted while the guests are physically present in the UK

The government pays Homes for Ukraine hosts a 'thank you' payment of £350 per month, and in Suffolk this is supplemented by an additional £25 per month by the council. You can find further information about the scheme here: https://www.gov.uk/guidance/becoming-a-sponsor-homes-for-ukraine

Finally, Suffolk County Council is offering a one-off Independent Living Payment (ILP) of £2,000 to Homes for Ukraine guests who are leaving their host accommodation and moving into their own home. To issue this payment certain criteria must be met, and Suffolk County Council will ask to see a copy of a valid, signed and dated (by both parties) legal tenancy agreement in the guest's name. The funding can be used for purchasing items to support the move to independent accommodation. The new accommodation can be either furnished or unfurnished and can be situated outside of Suffolk.

Guest(s) can apply for the Independent Living Payment by downloading a form from the council's website, which is available in English, Ukrainian and Russian. To access this form and details of other support for Ukrainian guests in Suffolk, please use this link to the council website:

Local Highways Issues - We will be without a local highways' liaison officer for up to three months, but the work will be covered by a member of the community engagement team. The team have provided a cost estimate for a revised scheme for the frontage of The Crown to provide a new length of footway. I have asked for further details. If the Parish Council decide that they wish to proceed to the detailed design stage, I have suggested that a meeting be set up with the designer. In the meantime, I have suggested that the money already committed to the previous scheme be transferred as a commitment to the revised scheme. But works would only be ordered following agreeing details on site with the designer.

I have again reported that the carriageway is not draining satisfactorily near the URC.

Also, I met with SCC Highways Drainage and residents in front of the former Post Office to ask for further investigation work to establish the extent of damage to pipes under the footway and discuss remedial works. It was agreed to carry out the investigation during an advertised road closure period. It later transpired that the road closure had not been authorized, and the investigation will need to wait.

Change to Local Bus Service - The amended circular service started on 31 August. However, some drivers had been instructed to use the new route and timings before that date, leading to confusion.

2026 Elections - The Mayoral Election is planned for May 2026. A decision on whether or not there will be County Council elections on the same day is awaited. It is anticipated that elections will take place for councillors to serve for two years, the second of which will overlap with the first year of the new unitary authorities.

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PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

SEPTEMBER 2025



This month's meeting opened with 5 members of the public, 6 Parish Councillors and Councillors Pearson, Watson and Welham.

Councillors' Reports: The full SCC and the District Council reports can be found elsewhere in Telstar. Cllr Welham advised that another new Community Liaison Engineer has been appointed. He suggested that a meeting should be arranged regarding the height of hedge between the school and village hall. There is now a timescale for the local government reorganisation.

MSDC Cllr was asked whether anything is happening about the proposed car park on the Landex site and it was agreed that this would be discussed at the end of the meeting. There is to be a public meeting regarding the local government reorganisation in Stowmarket on 10th September and another in Eye on 15th September. She advised that trees, hedging and wildflowers were available. MSDC are looking for volunteer social housing residents to join a committee to give their opinions on housing matters. Due to a change in the law, postal voters must re-register every few years. They were thanked for their quick response to getting the hedge in Gipping Road cut back on the bend.

Matters of Report: Work on the bus shelter has been completed and the post for SID in Church Road has been installed. The duck signs have also been erected on Trinity Meadows, and the ducks have been seen crossing the road in the correct spot. A contractor has been contacted regarding the reinstatement of sign on The Green, and the pond contractor is due to start work on September 8th.

Public Forum: One resident reported that the travellers are currently camped in Morrisons car park in Ipswich. Another resident advised that he was still not happy with the work carried out on the ash tree as he felt that it was too radical, but he was advised that the tree surgeon did need to remove 30% due to its general condition. He also reported another dead tree near Mill Street: this will be reported to SCC Highways. He felt that the report in Telstar that stated it was a long time since the village had held a garage/yard sale was misleading as it has only been 2 years that he was too unwell to arrange it. He was advised that it was part of the correspondence that was just being reported. He also reported that he has seen cars reversing out of a property driveway onto Devon Road. The last resident reported that the survey on flooding had now closed and he asked if there was now a new digital copy of the definitive map available, could the one at the Village Hall be replaced. He was advised that the PC were waiting to see if this would be affected by the proposed changes to the Village Hall before they purchased a new one. He also reminded everyone of the dates for apple day, the Telstar quiz and the Walkers Cup, all in September. He also asked about a meeting for an update on the Trim Trail.

Warranty Extensions for SIDs: After much discussion it was agreed not to take out the extended warranty on the SID's due to the costs which they felt could not be justified.

Insurance Renewal: The new insurance quote no longer includes debt recovery or contract disputes cover and these are now optional extras. It was agreed to add the contract disputes cover but not the debt recovery option. The last quote was a 3 year deal and need to check that this has in fact come to an end and if it is now an option or not.

A1120 Junction Improvement: After much discussion on the new proposal for the improvement outside the Crown it was decided to set a maximum budget of £12,000 and for Cllr Welham to pay for the design plans from his budget and to explore if he has any leeway for any further contribution from his budget.

SID Church Road: A new post has been installed and Councillors agreed to purchase a new SID to erect on the post. This one will not be turned due to the lack of space but instead to be turned off for the requisite time.

Green Preventative Measures: Councillors discussed whether further preventative measures needed to be added to other areas of the Green and agreed to walk round and decide on the best way forward. It is understood that this particular group of travellers from Ireland have every intention of staying in the area and are believed to be exploring various plots of land to purchase such as closed public houses where they can set up permanent encampments including a site between here and Stonham. They have already purchased land in Crowfield. We all need to be vigilant.

Litter Bins: It was agreed to update 3 litter bins that have broken and replace the dog bin by the kissing gate and to re-install the dog bin behind the butchers as well as move a dog bin which is currently located closed to a house.

Governance: It was agreed to accept the new sexual harassment policy and the template for an IT policy.

Sub-Committee/Working Group Reports:

Cemetery and Churchyard – It was agreed that the PC need to seek out a new social gardener to keep the cemetery and churchyard tidy as the current one is not responding to messages from the clerk.

Planning – There have been no new planning applications or decisions from MSDC.

Councillors' Reports: Cllr Studd reported that the bus shelter roof looks really good. Cllr Voden reported that he had received comments on how much better the village is looking. Cllr Murton felt that the bus shelters need to be looked at as the Cllrs carry out their walk around The Green. She had also been asked by Cllr Johnson to mention that you cannot buy a return ticket on the buses. Cllr Easter wanted to know if the soil excavated from the pond was still going to be retained and spread in the holes in The Green. Cllr Bridges reported that despite there not appearing to have been permission sought, parts of the school were being demolished as early as 5.45am. They have been advised about the dead branches in some of the trees surrounding the school grounds but have done nothing about it which is extremely dangerous bearing in mind the death of a small girl in a park in Southend earlier this summer.


Clerk's Report: The Clerk reported that work had started on footpath 32 but chippings were required to the edges to aid drainage. The family who had requested the disinterment of their loved ones remains have changed their minds and no longer require this to take place. She has seen a demonstration of a new cemetery package and will bring this to the next PC meeting as an agenda item. The Clerk has checked the policy regarding scattering of ashes and currently is unable to find this being mentioned in the policy. A further unauthorised encampment was attempted on 11th August but was foiled by the current preventative measures and they were promptly moved on by the Police. She has spoken to the insurance company who advised her to speak to their legal cover partner which she has done. MSDC have cut back the hedge on Gipping Road to improve visibility at the pedestrian crossing point. She has passed the ILCA qualification and signed up for FILCA. The Chairman congratulated her on obtaining the qualification.


Correspondence: Among the 13 items of correspondence this month there were 2 from MSDC including the August briefing notes and one outlining the District Councils' proposed 3 unitary authorities for Suffolk. There were 4 news bulletins from SALC, an update on the Norwich to Tilbury energy project. There were 3 from residents, 2 offering their thanks for the preventative measures taken to protect the Green and one advising on vegetation obscuring streetlights. Cllr Pearson has asked whether Stowupland have considered having a 20mph speed limit within the village and there was an email from the Definitive Maps Team advising on an update to the Gipping map which covers Stowupland.

The meeting closed at 8.58pm.

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COUNTRYSIDE RAMBLER

We had a good downpour of rain in the first week of September. I hope this will rejuvenate our lawns and return them to a healthy green colour for the rest of autumn. One of my concerns with the lengthy hot summer we had is the earthworm population. I know they bury deep into the soil and will coil themselves into a ball and wait until the moisture returns, but with the long hot spell were they able to survive and breed? Worms, especially the common lobworm, which we often come across whilst digging in our gardens, mate above ground on damp nights then retreat down their burrows when daylight arrives. I suppose we will only find out next spring if there is a substantial fall in the numbers of this valuable animal that aerates and improves our soil. So many creatures are reliant on worms for food and many, like badgers, rely on them as a staple part of their diet, as well as many garden birds, such as blackbirds and song thrushes, who feed their young on worms, so I suspect the youngsters of both these birds will be down on numbers this year.

Many of you may cringe when I mention spiders but one in particular, aptly named the wasp spider because of its black and yellow coloration, has been drawn to my attention. I normally come across these spiders near the coast and they weave a web similar to the other orb web spiders but very often low down in the vegetation. They often appear in loose colonies and, once one is found, it is often the case of searching and several can be spotted within a few metres of the original. The reason I mention this particular spider is the fact more are being found inland, so if in your garden you come



across this waspy looking arachnid don't be surprised as they are now turning up quite local. Another way to identify their web is a thicker whitish zig zag pattern may be evident in the centre part of the web. The female wasp spider can grow to a substantial size with the male being smaller and slimmer. August, September and early October is prime time to look for these and any other spiders if you are fascinated by the species.

I have seen several young roe deer this season and a few with twins so I suspect they have had a good breeding season. Hares also seem to have had a reasonable year with several leverets present early in the year, but they fall prey to many animals and birds of prey. I have found peacock and red admiral caterpillars this year but no small tortishell and very few adults were on the wing, so I surmise they are declining fast along with many other species.

Autumn is upon us; soon the leaves will be changing into their autumnal colours, and a chill will be felt early mornings and evenings. I enjoy every season, and autumn brings along a subtle change which will be quite welcoming after our hot summer.

Understanding Your Payslip – a guide for those returning to work

citizens Mid Suffolk advice If you've recently returned to work after some time away, you might find your payslip a bit confusing. You're not alone – it can take a little time to get used to the different sections and terms.

By law, employers must give you a payslip (on paper or online) showing what you've been paid and what's been deducted. It's a good idea to keep your payslips for up to six years, just in case you need them later.

Your payslip should include your employer's details, your name, and possibly an employee number. You'll also see a payment date (when your pay reaches your bank) and a tax period. The UK tax year starts in April, so tax period 01 is April, 02 is May, and so on.

You'll also see your National Insurance (NI) number – this is your personal number used to record your NI contributions, which help you qualify for state benefits like the pension.

Next is your tax code, set by HMRC. This usually includes numbers and a letter. The numbers show how much of your income is tax-free; the letter reflects your situation. You can check what your tax code means at https://www.gov.uk/taxcodes/what-your-tax-code-means. If you're on an 'emergency' code (ending in W1, M1 or X), you might be paying too much tax, so it's worth checking.

Your gross pay is what you earn before anything is taken off. This might include your basic pay plus extras like travel allowance. If you're paid by the hour, the rate and hours worked should be shown. If holiday pay is included with your wages, it should be listed separately.

Deductions may include tax, National Insurance, pension, or student loan payments. These are added up, and what's left is your **net pay** – the amount that goes into your bank.

You might also see taxable pay, showing how much of your income has been taxed so far this year.

If anything doesn't seem right, it's best to speak to your employer.

RAMBLINGS FROM THE POTTING SHED

As autumn spreads its golden colours across our beautiful countryside, it's time to reflect and learn some gardening lessons from the hottest summer on record. I have decided to install more water butts. In addition, I bought a couple of outsize planters from Roots and Shoots last spring which have remained full of rainwater from water butt overflow. I'll be purchasing another couple as this excess water was handy for the greenhouse watering. Planting, as already mentioned in this column, will remain grasses (I will be splitting current stock), irises and more sunflowers, Californian poppies and verbena. I'll also look at cutting in more borders and beds and reducing the grass. I think we were all a bit disheartened at the state of our lawns this year!

October jobs in the autumn garden are as follows:

- Plant hyacinth bulbs for Christmas, either in peat-free compost or bulb jars with water just beneath the bulb. Store in a cool, dark place until flower stems emerge.
- As the nights draw in, houseplant growth will start to slow down so gradually reduce the frequency of watering.
- Choose and plant spring bulbs in borders, containers and lawns.
- Continue dead heading and watering containers and baskets to keep them going until mid-autumn. Once they have gone over, replant for winter interest.
- Make the most of the still warm soil and autumn rains by planting new perennials to fill gaps in borders. Planting now means they will establish good roots before winter.
- As autumn arrives light levels begin to fall so take down any shading in the greenhouse so that the plants remain growing in the late autumnal warmth.
- Finish cutting hedges and neaten them up before winter. Cutting now means they are less likely to regrow and will maintain a nice outline. Shred and compost cuttings if not diseased.
- Harvest remaining apples and pears; they should twist off in your hand if ready.

In the press and social media, there have been some interesting comments on the state of buddleia this year, and not the sort you see alongside the rail lines. Mine, like many people's, looked awful in late spring and early summer. The leaves were mottled and small despite avid trimming and checking for insects. But my plants really rallied mid-summer. We had a shorter flower season, but the blooms were magnificent. A couple of varieties I will be seeking out next year will be 'Berries and Cream' with its mixed purple and white flowers. I'll also try to source the stunning 'Pink Pagoda' with its long, elegant flower. Narey's have a stock of 'Sungold', a firm favourite with the bees, so I will go for a couple of those too. That's all for this month, it's time for me to order a few bulbs for pots, so have a lovely month's gardening and I'll be back in November. Happy Gardening!

JUBILEE LADIES CHOIR





AGE RELATED MUSCLE LOSS IN OLDER ADULTS

Sarcopenia (age related muscle loss) is the main cause of health decline in older people. From around the age of thirty we start to lose muscle at a rate of 3-8% per year and as we get older this rate can increase. By the eighth decade of life, we will have lost around 50% of our muscle mass.

Sarcopenia symptoms include frailty, falls, slower walking pace, cognitive decline / dementia, Type 2 Diabetes, fatigue, muscle wastage and difficulty performing daily activities.

As we age, our bodies goes through certain changes that play a major factor in developing sarcopenia. For instance, your body doesn't produce the same amount of proteins your muscles need to grow and therefore there is a decrease in your body's ability to convert protein into energy. When this happens, your muscle cells get smaller.

In addition, as you grow older, changes in certain hormones, like testosterone and insulin-like growth factor, affect your muscle fibres. This can lead to sarcopenia.

Once you have lost a significant amount of muscle mass you are far more likely to develop T2 Diabetes due the fact that skeletal muscle is one of the target organs for insulin action and insulin resistance.

There are several worldwide studies linking sarcopenia to cognitive decline and dementia. This may be because they share similar risk factors; inflammation, oxidative stress, hormonal changes and malnutrition. Sarcopenia obesity is thought to be linked to malnutrition due to high consumption of ultra processed foods.

However, all is not lost! Sarcopenia can be reversed along with its associated diseases.

Physical activity is key for everyone but even more important as we age. In particular strength training for older adults is essential for good health and longevity.

Everyone can build muscle. Even if you are currently chair based, you can still improve strength. It requires consistent effort, a well planned program and progression. You need to be aiming to lift heavier as you progress, therefore building lean muscle.

But just as important is nutrition. As we get older we need to increase our protein, essential amino acids and fat intake. Protein is a factor for muscle growth and energy. Equally saturated fat is also essential for energy, for your immune system and brain health. It's not the demon it's been made out to be since the 1980s.

As we age our bodies are less responsive to anabolic stimulus of low doses of amino acids. However, this can be overcome with an increase in good quality protein consumption.

Red meat is the highest quality and most absorbable form of protein and essential amino acids. Beef is your best choice. Choose the fattier, slow cook cuts (these are also cheaper) or high fat content minced beef. Aim for two of your daily meals to be high in protein.

Reduce or even better cut out all ultra processed foods.

With good nutrition and a well planned strength training regime, you can prevent or reverse sarcopenia leading to a longer, healthier, more active, independent life.



STOWUPLAND LOCAL HISTORY GROUP

LOCAL HISTORY GROUP

For our September meeting we shared with our members some Stowupland Stories from our archives about our 'Poor and Sick.' Have you never wondered what health care was like

before the NHS? Who cared for the poorer members of society? Some of our stories may make it to a later edition of Telstar.

Our next meeting will be on **Wednesday October 1st,** 7.30 in the Village Hall. We will be joined by Dr Michael Walker who has done extensive research into the **Medieval Siege of Haughley Castle and the subsequent Battle of Fornham.** Some of the committee did go to hear him give the talk at Elmswell. I thought it would be a boring talk of blood and gore, victories and defeats but he made it a really interesting journey round Suffolk.

If you can't make that meeting, make a note in your diary to join us for another chapter of our Stowupland Stories on Wednesday November 5th. This time we will be looking at Crime and Punishment, or Law and Disorder in and around Stowupland. NB all crimes mentioned took place over 50 years ago. As usual tea and coffee will be available.

Scary as it is, we only have a few meetings to go before it is time to renew your membership or take out a new annual membership to the group. If you are not currently a member, then do come along as a guest (just £5.00) to find out how the past has shaped the place you call home.

Having just watched the cycling Tour of Britain come through Stowupland, I am reminded about the Swifts Speedway Cycling track. Back in the 1950's I understand this was on a field behind today's Little China. This was the decade after Leslie Brame lived in Stowupland but in the 1920s and 30s most villagers, young and old would have had bicycles. And although accidents still happened, I dare say the roads were safer places for cyclists than now.



In his memoirs, Leslie remembered that, amongst the many bikes he had, one was a Dayton Roadster racing bike. He described it as being lightweight with butterfly handlebars. He added the downside was that 'it had no free wheel, which meant I could not stop peddling to coast downhill.' He added that he often cycled 40 miles a day but the only way he could 'rest his legs and cruise downhill' was to take his 'feet off the pedals and park them on the handlebar, and that left me with minimal control'.

Leslie seems to have enjoyed tinkering with and repairing the family's bikes. He wrote that his sister Kittie once remarked that he 'seemed to be able to deal with anything that went wrong with a bike, and if nothing was wrong with a bike, I could still fix it.' I guess those were the days when most things were repairable and spare parts could be bought from local shops.

If the bikes looked a bit shabby, he would brighten them up by painting with 'new fast drying enamels, made of the new colloidon type of solvent' which came from a 'development in chemical production from wood pulp in a munitions factory taken over by the firm of Courtaulds.' He summarised 'there it was, a little factory on the River Gipping, a little way out of the town of Stowmarket, making the most powerful explosive known at the time, TNT, and as sidelines artificial silk and Robbialac. The miracle enamel that would dry in 10 minutes at most.'

Going back a bit further in time, to the early years of 'The Stowupland Flower Show and Fete' when it was held in the grounds of Stowupland Hall. A 1903 poster announcing the programme of sports events tells us that amongst other races there was a One-Mile Bicycle Race (for parishioners only) and an Open Two-Mile Bicycle Race. The entrance fee for either race was 6d (i.e. 6 old pennies). First prize for the one-mile race was 7/6 (7 shillings and 6d, so about 37p), whilst the prize for the 2-mile race was 15 shillings (for those who don't know or have forgot, there were 20 shillings to the pound, and a pound note was a piece of paper not a coin).

More up to date, Neil takes us back to our meeting in August, when Geoff Kay shared his research into 'The USAAF in East Anglia'. (Tune into Jerry's Jabbas on our website to hear an audio version of Neil's report).

In August we welcomed Geoff Kay to talk about what is often called "The Friendly Invasion" when over a million American servicemen were stationed in this country, a large part of that number being in the eastern counties. The USA entered the war after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbour and shortly after Germany declared war on the USA.

Geoff told us that a chance conversation one evening with a local sparked his interest in this subject. Geoff lives in Haughley Green near what used to be The Fox pub. And he was told that US servicemen frequented the pub in WWII and there had been some trouble due to animosity between black servicemen from a nearby encampment at Haughley Park and their white colleagues. From then Geoff set about researching the subject.

There were quite a few USAAF bases locally, including at Great Ashfield and Mendlesham, and construction of these was largely undertaken by black servicemen. Black and white weren't integrated, each having their separate segregated regiments. This, while the norm in the USA, was out of step with British attitudes. The locals, including Haughley's vicar Reverend Grainge White, were generally supportive of the black servicemen.

To avoid further trouble the pubs used by USAAF servicemen were designated for use by either black or white servicemen.

Geoff also talked about some American celebrities who had enrolled and made morale boosting visits to many of the airfields, these included Joe Louis the boxer and actors James Stewart and Jimmy Cagney as well as band leader Glenn Miller.

It is well known that many women married American servicemen, returning with them to the States after the war - the "GI Brides." Sometimes these marriages didn't work out, the wives finding that life in the US wasn't always what they had been led to believe.

We were pleased that local ex USAAF serviceman Don Mobley could join us and add his considerable knowledge to Geoff's interesting talk.

It had been quite a time since we had Geoff come to talk to us, but we hope to invite him back before too long for another of his engaging talks.

Continuing the WW2 theme, some time ago at a group meeting a member showed me some photos. They dated from the 1940s and one showed George Stannard on duty guarding a radar relay station near Creeting Lane. I was instantly interested as I had never heard of this before. In the photos there are buildings in the background but not enough to judge their function.

The little information that came with the photos suggested that the station may have relayed information from the radar station at Bawdsey to Duxford air base. I asked Bawdsey radar museum if they had any information, but they drew a blank. However, a clue came to light when I was looking through the 1939 register of inhabitants



of Stowupland that was taken to provide information for identification cards at the start of the war. The register lists all inhabitants with addresses, ages and occupations. Four people were listed as being telephonists at the "DFS." They were James Leeds, Leopold Denny, Percy Kerry and Walter Kerry. *

DFS, I found, was the abbreviation for "Direction Finding Station." I now had something to go on and an internet search brought up some information. Briefly, direction finding made it possible to locate enemy transmitters by triangulation, whether on land, on ships at sea or aboard aircraft. This information helped to build up a picture of where enemy forces were and what they were doing.

DF stations comprised a small hut with space for little more than one or two operators. There was sometimes an accompanying hut with facilities for those on duty and storage. RDF Huts were usually located in the middle of fields, as nearby trees, buildings or metal fencing would cause interference. The RDF hut was surrounded by four masts connected to the hut. A bearing could be taken by turning a small internal antenna. To reduce interference a circular grid of earthing radials was laid out around the hut, the earth was salted to increase conductivity, and the whole structure was ringed by a fence or wall.

From what can be seen on the photos our RDF seems to have conformed to this description. A further internet search brought up a list of known RDF station locations including the one at Stowupland. This showed that it did indeed forward its information on to Duxford and having an OS map reference, I was able to pinpoint the location. This was in a field between Creeting Lane and Bells Lane, the location no doubt selected as at 66 metres above sea level it is some of the highest ground in the area with an aspect towards the east.

The field belonged to Mr Carter who farmed the area and lived at Stowupland Hall. The RAF asked him for permission to use his field to which he agreed on one condition. Stowupland Hall had no electricity and Mr. Carter suggested that they should also connect the electricity cables necessary to power the station to Stowupland Hall connecting it to the grid (or at least to the local electricity supply).

*The 1939 survey only tells us who were living here in 1939. Margaret Rose (George's daughter who started this research off, told us that many other RAF personal were billeted in the village during the war. We knew local people had taken in child evacuees from East London in 1939, but we did not know that people were given the choice between taking in children or service personel.


